### **Tickets For Peninsula All-Star Football Game Selling At Record Clip**

Negaunee-Tickets for the sixth annual U.P. all-star football game are being sold at a record clip, members of the all-star game planning group were told last night.

The ticket sales committee said sales have been more accelerated this year than in any of the five previous years the game has been staged.

The stadium has a seating capacity of 3,780. All seats are reserved and tickets are sold according to this scale: Permanent grandstand section, \$2; bleacher section, 50-yard zone, \$1.75; other bleacher seats (all of them between the 10-yard lines), \$1.50; standing room, \$1. Children under 12 years of age will be admitted for 25 cents.

### **Letters Of Acceptance**

Tickets are on sale in Marquette Getz' Department Store and the Elks Club, in Ishpeming at the Northland Bus Liens and in Negaunee at Miller's News and the city recreation director's office. Tickets are also available in Gwinn.

Ed Stevens, all-star game director, said last night that letters of acceptance have been received from a large portion of the players who have been invited to participate in the classic.

Squad members, all of them players who graduated from high school last spring, are chosen by Upper Michigan sportswriters and sportscasters.

### **Meal Bids Received**

It was pointed out last night that arrangements are nearly completed for pre-game and half-time entertainment. Pre-game entertainment will be supplied by the Marquette Legion Clowns. A full 20-minute program will be presented during half-time. Bruce Stengel, nationally famous baton twirler, will be featured during the intermission, along with acts supplied by a Chicago theatrical booking agency.

Bids were opened for feeding squad members during their training period in Negaunee. All-star game committee members voted to award the bid to St. Paul's Alter Society, the group submitting the lowest bid--\$2.25 per player per day.

The next committee meeting was set for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.
