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### **South Team Wins U.P. Football Classic Before Crowd of 5,000**

Negaunee-Roaring down the field for 78 yards in the fourth quarter, the South turned back hard fighting North here Saturday night to win the U.P. all-star football classic, 6-0.

The final period of the game, which had been played on fairly even terms to that point, opened with the North punting to the South and the South took over on the its 22-yard line.

Mike Shatusky, Menominee, and Paul Gingrass, Iron Mountain, combined their backfield talents as they lugged the leather most of the distance. They carried the ball to midfield in four plays and then got it to the North 40 stripe, where a backfield in motion penalty set the South back five yards.

### **Shatusky Scores**

Gingrass then broke loose and behind some nice blocking, was driven out of bounds on the North 23-yard line. Shatusky moved it down to the 5 as the attack faltered for one play when the South fumbled, but recovered and then Shatusky, on the next play, tore into the scoring zone.

Frank Kopenski, Iron River, attempted the extra point, but his kick was blocked by George Colliens, Negaunee.

The game opened with the North kicking to the South and play during the initial period was straight football with neither team holding a decided advantage. Jack Gooseberry, Newberry, and Randolph Rivers, Negaunee, sparked the North attack, with Rivers getting a nice 14-yard gain from a fake punt formation.

## **Second Quarter**

The South opened the second stanza with a passing attack which proved harmless. Bob Wesoloski, Menominee, did the pitching, but was unable to hit any of his targets.

The North on the next series of plays had a pass interception nullified when its passer was roughed, but it had to give the ball up at midfield.

A South threat ended with North recovering a fumble and after taking a North punt, the South presented the evening's most serious threat. Shatusky broke loose and appeared headed for the pay-off area until he was forced out of bounds on the four-yard line.

## **South Fumbles**

At this point the breaks swung to the North as the South was detected offside for a five-yard penalty and then a bad pass from center caused a bumble in the South backfield which the North recovered just before the half ended.

The third quarter was a shadow of the first, neither team being able to make consistent gains.

The North, pressing after the run of Rivers, put pressure on the South when it worked the ball into striking distance, but a pass interception choked off the possibilities of a score.

The final period belonged strictly to the South.

Rivers and Gooseberry were the most striking players for the losers while Gingrass and Shatusky played the heavy roles for the winners.
